The Unique Villages Public Safety Department

n 1998, The Villages was comprised of approximately 9,000 residential homes located within the geographical boundaries of Lake County, Sumter County, and the Town of Lady Lake. The Villages was roughly 9,500 acres, growing at a rate of 1,200 homes per year, with an estimated population of 15,300 residents. During this time, the Lake County Fire Rescue Department,

a combination of paid/volunteer staff, provided fire protection services to Lake County and the Town of Lady Lake portion of The Villages.

The response from Lake County Fire Rescue would primarily be from their station located on Hermosa Street in Lady Lake, with the next closest unit responding from Lake Square Mall in Leesburg, FL. Lake County Fire Rescue provided basic life support (EMT) patient care, with minimum staffing of two firefighters on a 24-hour basis.

Fire protection services for the Sumter County portion of the Villages was provided by the Oxford Volunteer Fire Department out of two unmanned stations; one

located at the intersection of CR466 and Morse Boulevard and the other station located at CR466 and US-301, with backup provided by other volunteer districts in Sumter County.

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Emergency Medical Services were provided to Lake and Sumter Counties by Florida Regional EMS. Each ambulance was staffed with one Paramedic and one EMT, providing paramedic care and treatment to patients requiring transport. At that time, there was one EMS transport unit station in The Villages, with the next two closest units stationed in the City of Fruitland



Park and the City of Wildwood.

It was during this time that The Village Center Community Development District (VCCDD) introduced a "Proposal for Improved Public Safety" to provide full-

time fire protection and paramedic services to the growing community and rapidly increasing population, with the ultimate goal of reducing response times to emergency calls for service and standardizing the level of response within The Villages.

On October 6, 1998, a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the VCCDD was held for consideration and approval of the proposal for improved public safety, and with a unanimous vote, the Board authorized staff to move forward with the proposal: The Villages Public Safety Department was formed!

The Villages Public Safety Department (VPSD) began operations on October 1, 1999, with one station, one Fire Chief, and 12 Firefighters/Paramedics. During the first year of operation, the department responded to

1,040 calls for service, with the total number of calls for service increasing each year.

Over the past twenty years, the community and population have experienced a tremendous amount of rapid growth. The Villages is the largest single-site residential real estate development in the United States, currently spanning 90 square miles and is the national number one

master-planned community with an estimated population of over 134,000 residents. The Villages Public Safety Department has transformed and grown with the community.

Over the past two decades, VPSD has gone from a rural community and department to a suburban community and department. The fire stations are uniquely nestled in the neighborhoods and offer quick response times to all calls. The Villages Public Safety Department service area covers 90 square miles, with 150 firefighters operating out of nine fire stations. The Department has current daily staffing that consists of 50 firefighters and includes two Battalion Chiefs, with a goal of at least 70 percent of the on-duty firefighters being additionally

certified as Paramedics.

The Villages Public Safety Department provides ISO (Insurance Services Office) Fire Protection Class 2

- For our residents, the phone line remains open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday. The equipment request line is (352) 973-2284. Leave a message if we fail to answer. We will return your call.
- We now have an email address for those wishing to use email rather than call in your request. That email is vha.helpinghands.officemail@gmail.com. When using this service leave your name, phone number, and equipment you are requesting. We will respond to your request.
- Requested equipment can be picked up, or returning equipment can be dropped off at our office, Monday thru Friday between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.
- All returned equipment should remain outside the door until sanitized by office staff. If possible, please have your ticket number or copy of your receipt when returning equipment. That will expedite the return process.
- Our location is 1104 Main Street, ½ block from the Spanish Springs Town Square in the breezeway next to Kilwin's Ice Cream, Fudge and Chocolates.

Greetings,

y neighborhood just had a trivia night which gave me the idea for this month's article. By the time you read this, it will be July 5th, but I still wanted to take this opportunity to renew and/or review some of the facts surrounding the Fourth of July.

- The actual vote of the Continental Congress was on July 2, 1776. John Adams wrote that July 2nd should be remembered in history but on July 4, 1776, Congress officially adopted the Declaration of Independence, and it was not signed until almost a month later. When the Declaration was officially approved on July 4, John Hancock, and Charles Thompson (president and secretary of the Continental Congress) signed the draft that day. But the official copy wasn't signed by all 56 signers until August 2, 1776.
- The main author was Thomas Jefferson.
- The first celebration of the 4th of July was in Boston, MA in 1777
- The original flag had 13 stars representing the 13 original colonies. As states joined the union their star was added on the next July 4th.
- Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the national bird. I am glad that the eagle was selected. A turkey just would not look the same at the top of a flagpole.
- Two former presidents of the United States died on July 4th of the same year; John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, on July 4, 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of the Fourth of July. Later, President James Monroe died on July 4, 1831.
- Calvin Coolidge was the first (and so far, the only) president to have been born on the Fourth of July. He was born on July 4, 1872, in Plymouth, Vermont, and went on to become president in 1923.
- Today, the United States has a population of more than 332.5 million, but on July 4, 1776, there were only 2.5 million people living in the United States.

That means the population has grown by 13,200% since the first Independence Day.

- The Philippines declared independence from the United States on July 4, 1960
- One last bit of trivia that I did not remember
 the real name for the Statue of Liberty (a gift from France) is Liberty Enlightening the World.



Now Here Is Some Interesting Food and Drink Trivia:

- While many of us enjoy a red, white, and blue cocktail on the Fourth of July, George Washington may have been the first to start the tradition. On the second anniversary of the first Fourth of July, America was still fighting for independence in the Revolutionary War. George Washington ordered a double ration of rum for his soldiers (along with an artillery salute) to celebrate the holiday on July 4, 1778.
- Today Americans eat 150 million hot dogs and drink 70 million cases of beer each 4th of July.

I hope that you enjoyed your holiday and that you have recovered from all those hot dogs and beer – and maybe even a double ration of rum.

The best part is that the profits go to The VHA Community Foundation and are used to fund donations to various nonprofits in The Villages area.

In CDD 9 news, the board adopted the 2021-2022 budget. This budget does call for a 20% cut in the maintenance fees that are billed on your property tax bill in November.

The other part of the CDD billing that is on your tax bill is for the "bond" payment. To clarify a prior comment that I made – if you have



paid off your bond none of this applies to you as you are not billed this charge. If you have not paid off your bond, then you are billed annually for the bond payment. Your charge for this will drop this year because one of the bonds that makes up this "bond" payment was refinanced at a lower rate. Lower interest means a lower payment is due.

There are actually three bonds, issued at different times over several years, which make up this charge. In 2022

the next bond that can be refinanced is up and if there is a re-fi at that time then your billing may drop again. The third bond is small and may not be refinanced. Each bond had a 10-year call window – they could not be called in and refinanced until 10 years had passed since being issued. Bond 1 hit the 10-year mark, Bond 2 hits it in 2022.

On July 12 we will have a general meeting at Colony Regional Recreation Center with speakers addressing the ambulance issues in the county.

SHINE OFFERS MEDICARE HELP

With the Villages opening its pandemic restrictions, SHINE is resuming its Medicare counseling at various Recreation Centers. Beginning in July, 2021, SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) volunteers will assist clients with Medicare-related questions including drug, Medicaid, Medicare, Advantage, and Medigap plans. The service is free and unbiased, and reservations are not taken.

Counselors are scheduled at the following locations to assist area residents for one-on-one counseling on the indicated days:

- Eisenhower Recreation Center, 9:00 11:30 a.m. 1st & 3rd Wednesdays.
 - Chula Vista Recreation Center, 3:00 5:30 p.m. 1st & 3rd Fridays.
- Lake Miona Recreation Center, 9:00 11:30 a.m. 2nd & 4th Tuesdays.
 - Lady Lake Library, 2:00 3:30 p.m. 2nd & 4th Wednesdays.

Also, "Understanding Medicare", a group presentation geared toward those turning 65, will be made at 1:00 p.m. on the 2nd Wednesday of each month, at the Manatee Recreation Center.

services to the residents and visitors from all nine fire stations. VPSD is one of 112 fire departments (out of a total of 517) within the State of Florida and is one of 1,597 countrywide (out of a total of 41,117) classified as an ISO 2 fire department. Insurance companies use the ISO rating to set home insurance rates.

The fleet is comprised of five engine companies, five non-transport rescues, two quick attack vehicles, three ladder trucks, and one heavy rescue pumper: all apparatus are additionally equipped, staffed, and certified in compliance with Florida State requirements to provide first-response ALS non-transport emergency medical services. The department also deploys a Florida State certified/recognized Type 1 (heavy) Technical Rescue Team, which acts as both a local and regional state asset comprised of firefighters who specialize in High Angle Rope Rescue, Vehicle Machinery Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Trench Collapse Rescue, and Structural Collapse Rescue.

Last fiscal year The Villages Public Safety Department responded to 26,711 calls for service, a 2,468%

increase from the total number of calls during the first year of operation in 1999. They also provide a wide range of programs for the public including AED programs, family and friends CPR training, and a smoke detector program.

The Villages Public Safety Department is unique and will continue its growth and development synonymous with the community they serve. They are ready, and with purpose and resolve, to deliver on their mission statement with an unwavering commitment to the public they serve.

THRIFT SHOPPE CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



Time is getting closer for the completion of the expansion of Ye Olde Thrift Shoppe in Lady Lake nestled under the oaks at 110 W. Lady Lake Boulevard. Projected opening is in August, but the shoppe has been and continues to be open during the renovations.

The Thrift Shoppe's humble beginnings started in 2008 in one historical landmark building, and now excitement is mounting for the all-volunteer shoppe team and the community with an increased capacity of over 6000 sq. ft in retail space with plenty of room allocated for parking and donation drop off.

Lots of people like the excitement of saving money while finding a treasure to enjoy and know the money is going to a worthy cause. Proceeds from all sales at the Thrift Shoppe provide much needed medical equipment for the hospital, student scholarships, and the expansion of the hospital's cardiac unit.

The new expansion is designed to look the same as the average mainstream retailers, but with one significant difference between the two industries: resale offers high quality goods to consumers at prices that are much lower than the manufacturer's suggested retail price.

According to Green Story, an organization that helps consumers choose a more sustainable option and make greener choices, the purchase of one used item instead of a new one can reduce its carbon footprint by up to 82%. If everyone would purchase just one used item in the next 12 months, it would save 11 billion kilowatts of energy, 25 billion gallons of water, and 449 million pounds of waste.

SCAMMERS TARGET LOVED ONES OF COVID-19 VICTIMS



ccording to Seena Gressin, an attorney with the Division of Consumer & Business Education at the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), government imposters may have hit a new low with a scheme that targets the grieving survivors of people who died of COVID-19 by offering them help paying for their loved one's funeral expenses.



A real government relief program will refund up to \$9,000 for funeral expenses that people have paid since January 20, 2020 for loved ones who died of COVID-19. Survivors can apply for benefits by contacting the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) at 844-684-6333. The number is toll-free and multilingual services are available.

The program is open to American citizens, nationals of U.S. territories, and non-citizens legally admitted to the United States, regardless of income. If you apply, you'll need to show documents including receipts for your expenses and a death certificate that says the and was likely caused by COVID-19.

The program just began April 12, 2021, but even before it started, FEMA said it had reports of scammers contacting people and offering to register them for assistance.

Here's what you need to know:

- FEMA will not contact you until you have called FEMA or have applied for assistance. Anyone who contacts you out of the blue and claims to be a federal employee or from FEMA is a scammer.
- The government won't ask you to pay anything to get this financial help. Anyone who does is a scammer.
- The government won't call, text, email, or contact you on social media and ask for your Social Security, bank account, or credit card number. Anyone who does is a scammer.
- Don't give your own or your deceased loved one's personal or financial information to anyone who contacts you out of the blue. Anyone who does that and asks for that information is a scammer.

FEMA's Funeral Assistance FAQs have information about the documents you need to apply for funeral expenses. The FAQs also tell you what to do if the death certificate didn't identify COVID-19 as the likely cause of death, as sometimes happened early in the pandemic.

If you doubt a caller claiming to be from FEMA is telling the truth, hang up and report it to the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362 or the National Center for Fraud Hotline at 866-720-5721. Tell the FTC too, at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.

SUITED UP TO RIDE

"In days of old, when knights were bold and cycles were quite limited,

"They would don their armor and mount their steeds for rides that were primitive.

"Sometimes the knights encountered dragons and foes that challenged their mettle,

"After which they would give thanks for the metal that saved their kettle."

Today's Road Knights don special equipment (armor) as protection from the dragons and foes (e.g., pedestrians, dogs, golf carts, landscapers, trucks, etc.) we encounter in the pursuit of healthy living. Let's review:

• Gird firmly and comfortably in your riding shorts. They have a padded chamois to wick away perspiration, reduce chafing, and provide shock

absorption against bumpy roads.

- Don next a brightly colored jersey. We want to help the dragons and foes see us. Seniors have declining vision. Distracted drivers have no vision until they look up from their cell phone texting.
- Lace your feet into sturdy shoes. If a foot slips off a platform pedal, you can crash. If wearing flip-flops, you can lose a toe. Regular cyclists prefer clip-on shoes that truthfully keep their feet on the pedals.
- Place your properly fitted helmet on your head making certain that it will stay there if you get bucked off your mount. Remember that cycling is for our health, and we want to stay that way even knowing that dragons and foes are out to get us. That helmet of salvation can truly save your life.
- Turn on your lights of visibility even in daytime (front and rear) so that the dragons and foes can properly sense your presence. Remember, riding in the light is better than falling in the darkness.
- Examine your bicycle (Air-Brakes-Chain Quick

Check) to make sure that it is prepared to support you in your adventure. Keep your tires properly inflated, oil your chain, make sure your brakes stop you. High operational availability at the beginning of a ride helps yield reliability and a strong finish.

- Know the Rules of the Road, for they are the Bicyclists Bible of Survivability. It can protect you from the flaming attacks of the dragons and foes. Remember that your bike is a legal vehicle in Florida, and you are the driver.
- Hydrate. Carry a bottle of something to refresh you and keep you vertical.

Now that you have your full "armor" in place, you can mount up and venture out into bicycle land knowing you are as fully prepared as possible to ride, strive, and survive.
